The England Trees Action Plan


The England Trees Action Plan (ETAP) sets out our long-term vision for the sector, and the steps we will take over this parliament to start the journey to that vision. It will outline how Government will at least treble woodland creation rates in England by the end of this Parliament, as well as better protecting existing trees and woodland.

The strategic framework of the ETAP will deliver a number of Government ambitions. It will:

- Provide an ambitious, long term vision for trees and woodland in England to 2050 and beyond
- Outline Government's plans to deliver the trees aspects of the Nature for Climate Fund and other funding streams
- Act as a call to action to land-owners and managers, the third sector, and communities to help us meet these ambitions
- Align with other policy areas including peat and nature



The Structure of the England Trees Action Plan



Long Term vision to 2050 and beyond - The England Trees Action Plan sets out Government's long-term, generational vision for the sector and England's treescape: what it needs to deliver and how Government will help others deliver it.

There are five chapters outlining over 80 policy actions Government will take during this Parliament to help meet the long term vision. These chapters are:

- Expanding and connecting our trees and woodlands
- Trees and Woodlands as part of the green economy
- Protecting and improving our trees and woodlands
- Connecting people with trees and woodlands
- Knowledge and science for trees and woodlands

Key Announcements

Government will:

- Aim to at least treble woodland creation rates in England by the end of this Parliament
- Launch the England Woodland Creation Offer, a major new tree planting grant to plant over 10,000 hectares of new woodland over the lifetime of the grant.
- Extend the Urban Trees Challenge Fund, and launch the Local Authority Treescape Fund providing investment to support the planting and establishment of trees in urban areas and trees outside of woodlands to benefit local communities.
- Expand the size of the nation's forests by working with public and private land owners to create new woodlands under Forestry England's management
- Create at least three new Community Forests and select three new English regions to become part of the Woodland Creation Partnership scheme providing greater public access to woodlands where they are needed most and boost tree planting rates.
- Strengthen protections for ancient and long-established woodlands that have been in situ since the 19th century
- Setup a new fund to support UK tree nurseries to enhance quantity, quality, diversity and biosecurity of domestic tree production

This will be supported by over £500 million for trees from the Nature for Climate Fund

Expanding and Connecting our Trees and Woodlands

England Woodland Creation Offer

EWCO will cover capital costs

- This will be at a 100% intervention rate (up to An £8,500 per hectare cap). It will also provide:
- annual maintenance payments for 10 years (£200 per ha)
- payments towards recreational infrastructure such as paths and picnic benches (100%)
- payments towards forest roads and tracks (40%)
- stackable additional contributions that recognise the public benefits that well-designed woodland created in the right locations will generate

Additional Contributions

- Nature Recovery available where woodland creation will expand areas of existing priority woodland, create areas of new native woodland or extend habitat for red squirrel populations. Support for these activities will help woodland-dependent priority species to recover. High £2,800/ha, Medium £1,100/ha
- Riparian buffers available where the creation of native broadleaved woodland along water courses will improve river habitats. £1,600/ha
- Access available where woodland creation will provide long-term permissive access for recreation on new areas of land. £2,200/ha
- Close to settlements available where woodland creation will provide social and environmental benefits by being close to people. £500/ha

Additional Contributions

- Water Quality available where woodland creation will help reduce pollutants through land use change that reduces fertilizer application and/or creating woodland that intercepts pollution and sediment before it reaches water courses. £400/ha
- Reduced Flood Risk available where woodland creation can help reduce the risk of flooding. £500/ha

What's happening locally?

- Increasing our delivery capacity
 - Recently recruited 3 more Woodland Officers and 2 more Woodland Creation Officers and an extra Field Manager
- Increasing our national and local specialist / expertise capacity
 - Recruited an Area Ecologist (Lisa Kerslake) each area has one.
 - Recruiting another northern based Landscape Adviser (closed awaiting pre appointment checks)
 - Currently have a live recruitment for 2 Historic Environment Adviser posts.
- Working closely with partners (including)
 - Forestry and Woodlands Advisory Committees, Woodland Trust, Community Forest's and Great Northumberland Forest.
